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## PUBLIC SAFETY AND HOMELAND SECURITY BUREAU SEEKS COMMENT ON THE PETITION FOR RULEMAKING OF THE AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF STATE HIGHWAY AND TRANSPORTATION OFFICIALS

The Public Safety and Homeland Security Bureau (Bureau) seeks public comment on a petition that addresses various aspects of the Federal Communications Commission's (Commission) regulation of Travelers' Information Station (TIS) operations.<sup>1</sup>

On March 16, 2009, the American Association of State Highway Transportation Officials (AASHTO) filed a petition for rulemaking (AASHTO Petition) requesting the Commission to amend certain TIS rules.<sup>2</sup> Specifically, AASHTO asks the Commission "to modify Section 90.242(b)(7) to clarify that Travelers' Information Station … facilities may be used to: (1) broadcast advisories regarding missing children, known as America's Missing: Broadcast Emergency Response Alerts ("AMBER Alerts"); and (2) transmit information regarding the availability of 511 services."<sup>3</sup> The Bureau seeks comment on whether to grant AASHTO's request to initiate a rulemaking proceeding to consider the above-listed rule changes.

Pursuant to Section 1.405, 47 C.F.R. § 1.405, interested parties may file statements in support of or in opposition to the AASHTO Petition on or before May 26, 2009. Parties interested in submitting replies to such statements must do so on or before June 8, 2009. All statements in support of or in opposition to the AASHTO Petition and replies to such statements should reference that petition and RM-11531.

All statements in support of or in opposition to the AASHTO Petition may be filed using: (1) the Commission's Electronic Comment Filing System (ECFS), (2) the Federal Government's eRulemaking Portal, or (3) by filing paper copies. *See Electronic Filing of Documents in Rulemaking Proceedings*, 63 FR 24121 (1998).

- Electronic Filers: Statements in support of or in opposition to the Petition and replies to such statements may be filed electronically using the Internet by accessing the ECFS: http://www.fcc.gov/cgb/ecfs or the Federal eRulemaking Portal: http://www.regulations.gov. This matter shall be treated as a "permit-but-disclose" proceeding in accordance with the Commission's *ex parte* rules.<sup>4</sup> Persons making oral *ex parte* presentations are reminded that memoranda summarizing such presentations must contain summaries of the substance of the presentations and not merely a listing of the subjects discussed. More than a one- or two-sentence description of the views and arguments presented generally is required.<sup>5</sup> Other requirements pertaining to oral and written presentations are set forth in section 1.1206(b) of the Commission's rules.<sup>6</sup>
